Joseph Stella's Futurism Between Italy and the U.S.

On Thursday November 10, 2011 at 6pm in the Billy Johnson Auditorium of <u>Newark Museum</u> [2] (49 Washington St, Newark, NJ) there will be a panel discussion on the importance of the works of an Italian-American artist Joseph Stella.

This panel is presented by The "Theresa and Lawrence R. Inserra Chair in Italian and Italian American Studies" at <u>Montclair State University</u> [3] in collaboration with the Newark Museum, the <u>Consulate of</u> <u>Italy in Newark</u> [4], the <u>Embassy of Italy in Washington D.C.</u> [5], and the Art History Program of the Department of Art and Design at Montclair State University.
